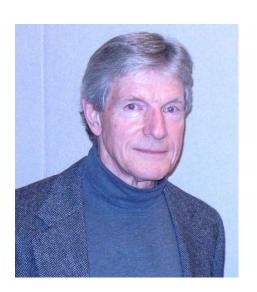

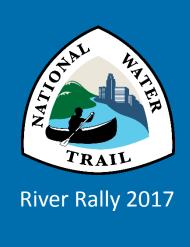

### Vision, Mission, Goals and Objectives

Vision: A Huron River Renaissance

Turning our communities toward the river to transform the Huron River corridor into a premier destination in Michigan and the Great Lakes.

Mission: A 104-mile inland paddling trail connecting people to the river's natural environment, its history, and the communities it touches in Michigan's Lower Peninsula.

- Stimulate local economies
- Improve recreational access and opportunities
- Encourage physical activity
- Improve community pride and encourage partnerships
- Make river and communities healthier
- Highlight cultural and historical significance





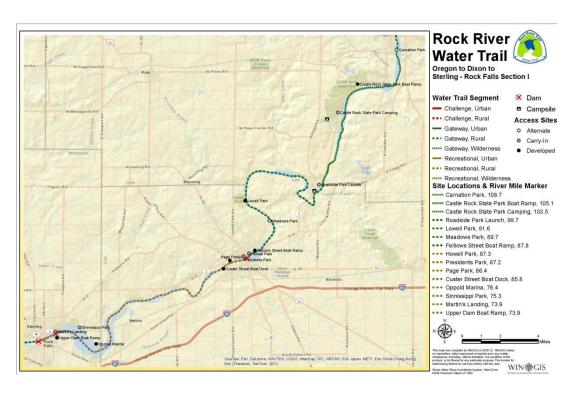

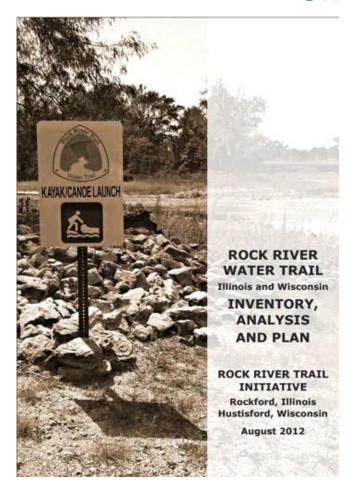

### 7 Best Management Practices

1

### RECREATION OPPORTUNITIES

The water trail route has established public access points that accommodate a diversity of trip lengths and provide access to a variety of opportunities for recreation and education.

2

#### **EDUCATION**

The water trail provides opportunities to learn about the value of water resources, cultural heritage, boating skills and outdoor ethics.



#### CONSERVATION

The water trail provides opportunities for communities to develop and implement strategies that enhance and restore the health of local waterways and surrounding lands.



#### COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Local communities provide support and advocacy for maintenance and stewardship of the water trail.



#### PUBLIC INFORMATION

The public is provided with accessible and understandable water trail information, including details for identifying access and trail routes; cultural, historic and natural features; hazards; and water quality. The water trail is promoted to the community and a broad national audience.



#### TRAIL MAINTENANCE

There is a demonstrated ability to support routine and long-term maintenance investments on the water trail. Facilities are designed, constructed and maintained by incorporating sustainability principles.



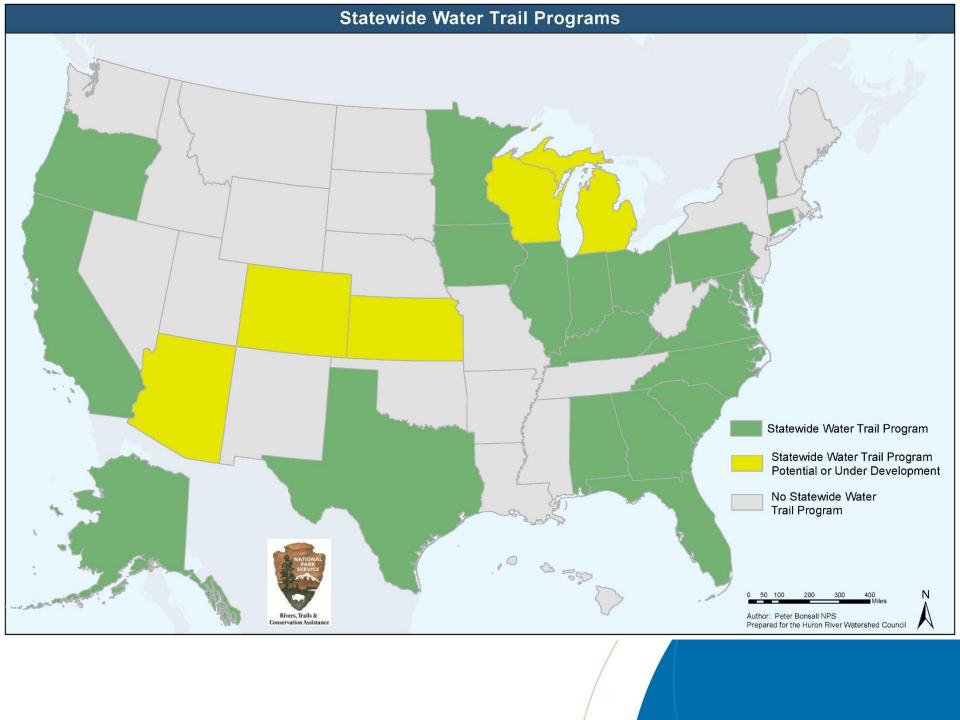
#### **PLANNING**

An applicant must also incorporate and maintain a water trail plan that describes a vision, desired future conditions, and strategies to strengthen bestmanagement practices.

## NATIONAL WATER TRAILS SYSTEM



A distinctive national network of exemplary water trails which are designated by the Secretary of the Interior. The trails within the National Water Trails System are cooperatively supported and sustained.

### Access

Who's responsible for public safety on water trails?

Private landowners generally immune except for

- Fees, with exceptions
- Attractive nuisance
- Dangerous conditions

State and local agencies protected, assuming

- Reasonable care
- (No) Hidden dangers

#### Important to know

- State recreational use statutes
- Guidelines related to public easements
- Property insurance coverage









### Permitting

- State water quality
- US Army Corps of Engineers
- Easements
- Ownership vs. lease
- City, County, State











### **Portages**

Land routes to transport boats around dams or other obstructions, to and from a launch area or between access sites.











### Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)

Access for persons with disabilities and universal access for all

Physical – Structural modification to provide access to the shore or launch site, as well as the watercraft.

- Access route
- Cross slope
- Level and stable landing/loading area
- Transfer Assistance
  - Transfer step
  - Transfer board
  - Overhead handles (grab bars)
- Surface Textures









### **ADA and Universal Accessibility**



Surface Grade **Open Space** Close to parking











### **Universal Design:**

A design useable by all people, to the greatest extent possible, while both maintaining the character and experience of the setting and providing access, without separate or segregated access for persons with disabilities.

### **Economic Benefits**

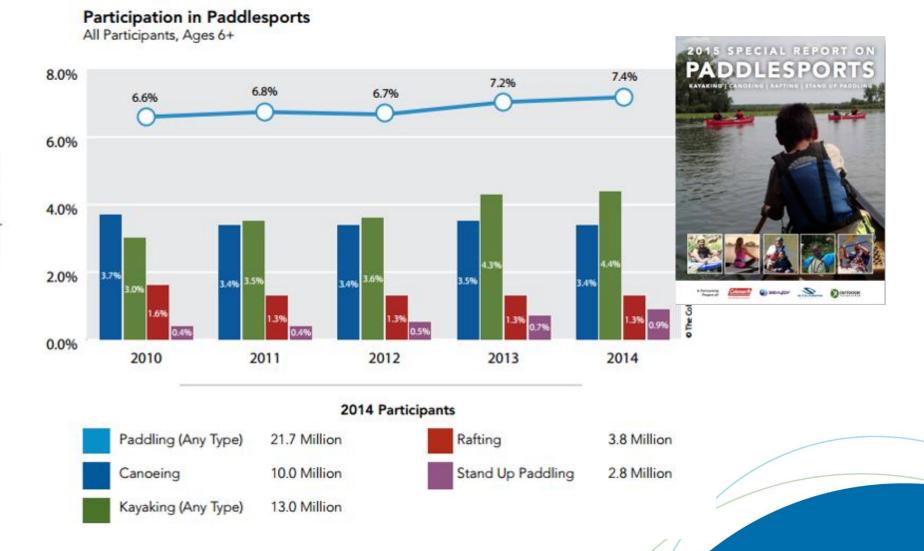
- Build strong, economically vital communities

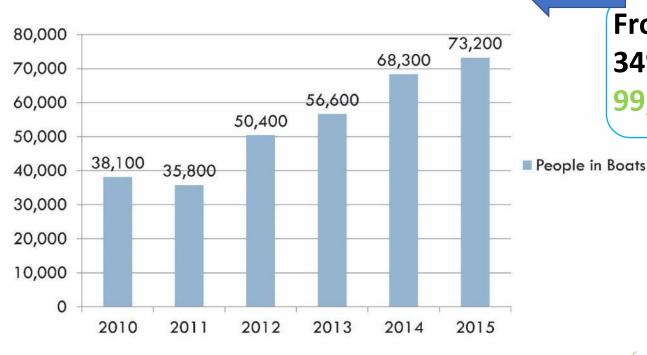

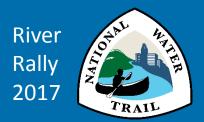
#### **Revenue FY2016:**

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### Measuring Economic Impact

The Huron River and Huron River National Water Trail are estimated to have the following economic impact on the five-county region in which they are located:

- \$53.5M in economic output (\$29.9M direct + \$23.6M indirect ) annually
- \$628M in added property value
- 2.6M visitor days annually
- \$3.8B total economic value of services provided by the Huron River corridor

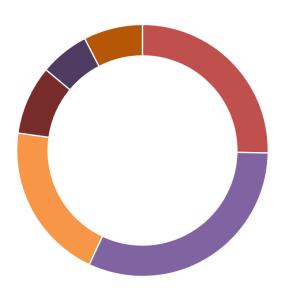

### 7. Pursuance

#### Construction, Implementation, and Operation

- New paddle craft access sites
- Primitive campsites siting, approval and design
- Recreational Trails Program of FHWA
- Section 4(f) federal DOT Act of 1966 FHWA funded projects
   Avoid and minimize impacts to recreational resources









#### Construction, Implementation, and Operation

- Unique site solutions
- FERC-licensed dams











#### Construction, Implementation, and Operation

- Enhanced paddle craft access sites universal accessibility
- Dam removal











River Management Society and South Platte River Working Group

Basis for approach – interviews with

- City officials, rescue, parks & rec, law enforcement
- Outfitters, private boaters
- Community leaders, educators









#### **Objectives**

- Educate river awareness, on-water environment
- Minimize river accidents and fatalities
- Be relevant for young males

#### **Creative Strategy**

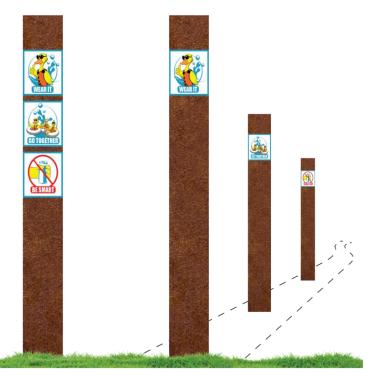
- Keep it simple
- Assume readers know nothing about river safety
- Provide in-depth information where people stop and linger
- Avoid 'death and destruction' messaging intending to evoke fear
- Avoid standardized symbols if they don't 'read' quickly







- The ideal configuration shows one graphic in plain sight at a time
- For short trails, image 'groups'
- Cartoons can read well and avoid need to address gender, diversity













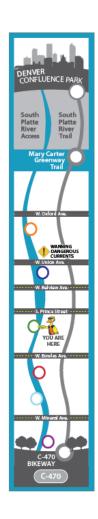
- Wear a life vest
- Know the water conditions
- Stay sober
- Float with friends
- Know where you are
- Practice river etiquette





- Reach-wide map graphic 'parent' for signs at individual access points
- Real time flow readouts above rapids and primary access points (not yet completed)













#### Launch Sites and Dam Warning Signs











#### Maintenance

- Trail maintenance monitor PITO conditions, portage infrastructure, light maintenance, install and repair signage, monitor river for safety concerns
- River cleanup and clearing of blockages and hazards





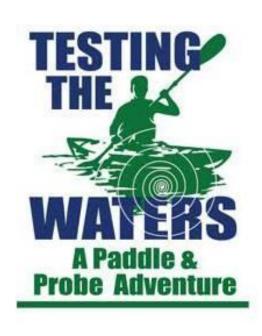






### Stewardship

- Water quality monitoring and community education
- Natural resource conservation and environmental planning and design











### Stewardship

- Volunteerism and responsible outdoor ethics
- Huron River Water Trail Ambassadors
- Rock River Trail 10,000 trees annual project











#### **Promotion**

- Branding, marketing and programming strategies and materials
- Partner with tourism associations and regional CVBs
- Trail towns as a promotional concept and economic driver
- Tailoring long-term promotional and use planning for diversity and the future majority

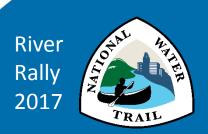
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# **Moving Forward**

- Placemaking via trails & economic development = nonpartisan



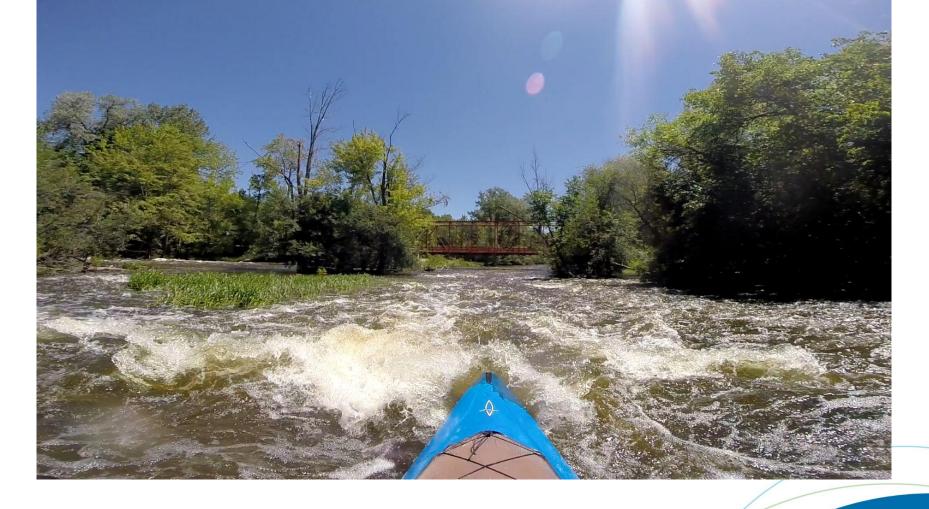
